

WHAT TO VISIT IN VALPARAÍSO?

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HOUSE MUSEUM LA SEBASTIANA

La Sebastiana is one of the three houses — along with La Chascona in Santiago and the Casa de Isla Negra— that were owned by the Chilean poet Pablo Neruda. Located in Valparaíso, on Cerro Bellavista, it stands out for the beauty of its construction and its magnificent view of the port bay. Like the other two, it has been converted into a museum managed by the Neruda Foundation.

REINA VICTORIA ELEVATOR

The Reina Victoria elevator, located in Cerro Alegre, is one of the 30 elevators that are part of the history of the city of Valparaíso. It was built in 1902 and was inaugurated on March 4, 1903. It was declared a Historic Monument on September 1, 1998.



CERRO CONCEPCION AND CERRO ALEGRE

Cerro Concepcion and Cerro Alegre are located in the city of Valparaíso. Delimited from each other by Urriola street, they historically make up a unitary sector, urbanized and built largely by English and German immigrants, starting in the first half of the 19th century, in an organized and planned manner.



PLAZA SOTOMAYOR

Considered the largest civic center in the city, as well as the main axis of the Barrio Puerto, important buildings are located there, such as the Monument to the Heroes of Iquique, where the remains of Arturo Prat lie, and the Armada de Chile Building, corresponding to the old Administration.

PORT OF VALPARAISO

The Port of Valparaíso is the maritime terminal located in the city of the same name. It is the port with the highest arrival of passengers in the country and the second with the highest movement of containers, after San Antonio.



ARTILLERY ELEVATOR

The Artillery elevator is one of the 30 elevators that are part of the history of the city of Valparaíso. It was inaugurated on December 29, 1892. It is located on the hill of the same name. It is currently the elevator with the highest passenger demand in the city.
